Despite best efforts to educate, problems still exist due to resistance to proper methods, product selection, and practices.

This course will provide you with the standards, recommendations, and necessary practices to achieve problem-free, durable tile installations. We will review substrate preparation, performance testing, and more to help achieve successful systems.

ANSI A108.5-2.2.2 Outlines the process of achieving the coverage needed to bond tile or stone to the wall or floor substrate. Spot the results in:

Voids and hollow spots beneath the finished surface that will not support point loading and compressive forces. Cracked tile and collapsed walking surfaces issues are not just cosmetic issues...they create trip/fall hazards.

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These same voids and hollow spots will sound hollow, which is also considered to be an installation defect. In addition, moisture can become trapped in these voids. Discolaration of tile, stone, and grout can result from trapped moisture. Microbial growth (i.e. mollc) can also find a home within these pockets and voids of moisture.



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ANSI A108.01-2.4 Substrates in Wet Areas

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NAPSA—Doi.t-yourselfers, builders and remodelers now have a new consideration for their bathroom designs. Changes made to the 2006 International Residential Code (IRC) no longer recognize moisture-resistant, paper-faced drywall (commonly known as green board) as a suitable tile green board) as a suitable tile such as tub and shower surrounds. Instead, a cement-based back-

backing material in wet areas such as tub and shower surrounds. Instead, a cement-based backerboard or other approved moisture-resistant tile backerboard product must be specified to meet IRC requirements. These products tend to provide better overall performance in wet areas than ereen bourd.



"Floor Prep..."

It is the responsibility of the tile contractor to inspect the substrate (floor & wall) prior to installation, and notify the general contractor, in writing, of any defects which would prevent work from proceeding.

- Grease, Oil, Paint, Wax, Bond Breakers, Dust, Construction Debris
- Patching, Repairing, Leveling, Protrusions
- Gypcrete, Lightweight Concrete Priming/ Sealing

Thin-set is never to be used to patch or fix the substrate... never...ever!







Do I Really Have to

Deflection...

- The combination of larger tile & stone and cost cutting subfloor building methods (24" on-center/3/4" substrate) is wreaking havoc on residential floors.
- It has been a repeated request by tile/stone contractors to develop a method for identifying problematic floors.

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RFI Continued...

- A/E & owners are sometimes opposed to oral change orders or RFI responses.
- Written RFI's can sometimes be viewed by both the contractor AND owner as tedious, timeconsuming and schedule killers.
- The scope of your concerns, the potential financial liability of the RFI in question, and the relationship between the subcontractor, GC, and the owner may also determine how RFI's are handled.
