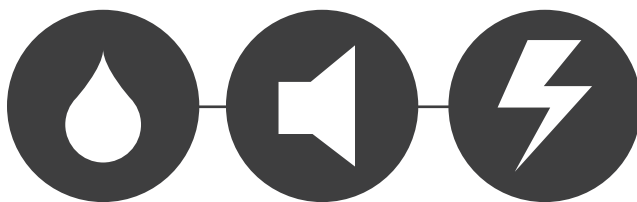


California Proposition 65 Product Labeling

Description:

Prop 65 is a law in California that requires manufacturers to label their products if they contain any of the 900+ chemicals on the Prop 65 list.

The warning is not an indication of risk. It is just a notification that one of the chemicals is present, regardless of how small the chemical's presence is.

What are Prop 65 labeling requirements?

Proposition 65 requires businesses to provide warnings to Californians about significant exposures to chemicals that cause cancer, birth defects, or other reproductive harm. These chemicals can be in the products that Californians purchase, in their homes or workplaces, or that are released into the environment.

Many common items contain chemicals that are on the Prop 65 list.

Examples: Grilled asparagus, coffee, aloe vera, carrots, apples, straws, Styrofoam, and stainless steel all require the warning label because they contain a small amount of a chemical on the Prop 65 list.

After August 31, 2018, manufacturers had to provide specific labeling of their products to comply with this regulation. Because Noble is not able to control where our products will eventually end up, we have decided to label all products regardless of where they are being shipped.

According to the California labeling requirements, we are forced to label all products that contain polystyrene (Styrofoam). Our products have not changed, and are completely safe when used as intended.

Hopefully this helps you understand the reason behind our labeling changes. If you do a web search for Prop 65, you will find many articles referencing the California law. Again, the label is not an indicator that our products have changed in any way, just a reflection of the change in labeling requirements for the State of California.
